Oregon Voices Data Summary



About the Summary

Oregon Voices began in summer of 2021 when The Ford Family Foundation invited 18,000 randomly selected households — 500 in each Oregon county — to complete a survey online or by mailing back a paper response. We then reached out to Ford Family friends and partners, encouraging them to participate and invite others to do the same. In total more than 4,300 Oregonians from all walks of life responded to the survey, generously sharing their honest reflections on the question we posed: What is it like to live in your corner of the state?


The following report provides a high-level summary of the survey data received from those who responded in Clatsop County. Here the number of random household respondents outnumbered the Ford Family respondents. For clarity, the two data sets have been combined in the visualizations below, even though the two samples show differences in demographics and response patterns. Please interpret the findings with this in mind. Data have been rounded to the nearest whole number.

Total number of Clatsop County respondents: 64Random household sample: 40, Ford Family sample: 24

Key Highlights

- Located in the Northwest corner of Oregon, Clatsop County is home ot Fort Clatsop and Clatsop Community College. Survey respondents appreciate the natural beauty of their home and the proximity to both mountains and the Oregon coast.
- Respondents expressed concern about the increased costs of living and housing due to rising property values and gentrification alongside wage stagnation. Nearly three-quarters of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that homelessness is a challenge.
- Respondents are concerned with the threat of tsunamis and earthquakes, noting the lack of nearby emergency services.




Top 3 reporting zip codes

"Affordable housing is needed. We need homeless support. Drugs are out of hand."




Age of respondents

Race/Ethnicity



















Services

"Housing cost is astronomical. A single person cannot afford a studio. Rent is upwards of \$1,000. Most of us work service jobs and do not make the required three times the amount of rent. If I lose my current housing situation, there is not another one bedroom for rent for less than \$1,200, which I can't afford on a single person's salary."

"Watch out for bad roads and heavy traffic."

"The lack of social service resources results in challenges like addiction, mental health concerns, houselessness, work force shortage and crime cycles."

"Lack of funding for infrastructure"

"Inability to address the lack of workforce housing and the homeless transient population."


