Oregon Voices Data Summary



About the Summary

Oregon Voices began in summer of 2021 when The Ford Family Foundation invited 18,000 randomly selected households — 500 in each Oregon county — to complete a survey online or by mailing back a paper response. We then reached out to Ford Family friends and partners, encouraging them to participate and invite others to do the same. In total more than 4,300 Oregonians from all walks of life responded to the survey, generously sharing their honest reflections on the question we posed: What is it like to live in your corner of the state?


The following report provides a high-level summary of the survey data received from those who responded in Jefferson County. Here the number of random household respondents outnumbered the Ford Family respondents. For clarity, the two data sets have been combined in the visualizations below, even though the two samples show differences in demographics and response patterns. Please interpret the findings with this in mind. Data have been rounded to the nearest whole number.

Total number of Jefferson County respondents: 79Random household sample: 59, Ford Family sample: 20

Key Highlights

- The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs reservation is located in Jefferson County.
- Respondents indicate that drought, fire and climate change present a
 consistent threat to the community. They fear for the local agricultural
 economy suffering due to the lack of water supply.
- Respondents say diversity exists within their community, but some community members are discriminated against based on their views or who they are.




Top 3 reporting zip codes

"I appreciate the nature, the smalltown vibe, and the proximity to both Bend and Portland."


"I am concerned about the kids in my community and their spiritual, emotional and physical needs."

"We have freedom of movement and ease of access to services."


"There is a great deal of wealth disparity in this region, and the schools are poor. We also have a larger problem with homelessness and substance abuse in our community now versus five years ago."



Race/Ethnicity









Because we live on east side of Cascades, our community does not agree with most other counties on political issues."











Services

"Even though both my spouse and I work, it is still hard to make ends meet."

"Internet that is reliable is difficult AND disappointing — even when paying the second most expensive package. It has directly impacted my work and source of income."

"I wish that there was better residential planning for homes. I wish that I just had a place that I could go buy a pair of underwear, a bra and a baby shower gift. I wish that I could support my local business community, but there is essentially no business community to be had. I wish that I could feel safe enough to walk my dog around the block without carrying a gun or pepper spray. I wish there were ordinances to help keep the community clean, free of trash and homes in good repair."

"We need services for seniors, like groceries and medications delivered."

"We are limited on resources to help with food, basic needs items, exterminator services and housing that is fair for all." Respondents who reported they "agree" or "strongly agree" the following services are available where they live:
