## Oregon Voices Data Summary



## **About the Summary**

Oregon Voices began in summer of 2021 when The Ford Family Foundation invited 18,000 randomly selected households — 500 in each Oregon county — to complete a survey online or by mailing back a paper response. We then reached out to Ford Family friends and partners, encouraging them to participate and invite others to do the same. In total more than 4,300 Oregonians from all walks of life responded to the survey, generously sharing their honest reflections on the question we posed: What is it like to live in your corner of the state?

The following report provides a high-level summary of the survey data received from those who responded in Yamhill County. Here the number of random household respondents outnumbered the Ford Family respondents. For clarity, the two data sets have been combined in the visualizations below, even though the two samples show differences in demographics and response patterns. Please interpret the findings with this in mind. Data have been rounded to the nearest whole number.



## **Key Highlights**

- Yamhill County hosts much of Oregon's wine industry and has the largest area of any Oregon county planted in grapes. It is home to George Fox University and Linfield University.
- Respondents are concerned about the rise of conservativism, alt-right political views, and bigotry within the community
- Respondents think highly of the community they live in and report that community members help each other out.




"There seems to be some economic polarity in my community. On the one hand the cost of housing indicates wealth, on the other hand we have a lot of people struggling to get by."

"The divisiveness over race and equity is a concern."


"There is a political divide and culture wars between conservative and progressive ideologies."


#### Age of respondents

## Race/Ethnicity









### **Community participation**

"I am becoming less comfortable in Yamhill County due to the threatening behavior of those who would identify themselves, or the press would identify, as the far-right."

"If people don't talk about politics or social issues — everyone is ready and happy to help each other." Respondents indicated the extent to which they perceive that people where they live participate in their community in the following ways:













"Much of our town lacks sidewalks. It's a drive-thru community to larger towns and people drive incredibly fast."

"I believe housing, child care and homelessness are our biggest issues to solve."

"I'm afraid that we are pricing people out of our community with the insane home prices."

"The homeless population just keeps growing, and resources for help are becoming less and less." Respondents who reported they "agree" or "strongly agree" the following services are available where they live:
